Review and comment on a stormwater pipeline replacement project on Fourth

Avenue between Santa Fe and Torres Streets, and Torres Street between Fourth

and Fifth Avenues.

City policy requires that undergrounding projects be reviewed by the Forest and Beach Commission during several planning phases of each project.

The City of Carmel is planning to replace a section of stormdrain that currently runs across several private lots in the vicinity of Torres St. and 4<sup>th</sup> Ave., onto the city street right-of-way. The purpose of this is to project is to avoid liability from damaged property if the current pipe fails, as well as locating the pipeline in an area where access for service or repairs can be accomplished without disturbing private property.

The current pipeline runs in a southwest direction from the near southwest corner of Santa Fe St. and 4<sup>th</sup> Ave. to mid-block on Torres St. between 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Aves. The preliminary plans show a new pipeline connecting to an existing manhole at Santa Fe St. and 4<sup>th</sup> Ave and extending westward to the intersection of Torres St. and 4<sup>th</sup> Ave. From this point the new pipe runs south on Torres St. to connect to a manhole and existing pipe about mid-block between 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> Aves.

There are two areas that are near trees. The first area is on 4<sup>th</sup> Ave. mid-block between Santa Fe St. and Torres St. where there is a Monterey pine located in a small island in the middle of the street. The new pipeline must go almost directly beneath this tree due to the location of other underground utilities in the right-of-way. The pine tree is declining and I do not think it has much to offer in the future. I support removing the tree at this time in conjunction with the project.

A secondary question is whether to plant a replacement tree back in the center of the roadway. This is a relatively narrow section of roadway and the tree does contribute to slowing cars as they navigate around the tree. The commission should make a recommendation on this item.

The other area that is near trees is on Torres St. behind the city corporation yard. There are two relatively young Monterey cypress and a relatively young Monterey pine that will be within 5 feet of the pipeline location. Unfortunately there is only a small area in the right-of-way where the pipeline can be located due to the location of other utilities. The pipe material is reinforced concrete so there very little ability to arc the pipe over short distances.

As the work enter the area near these trees I recommend the City Forester be on site and the first 2-3 feet of excavation be done by hand to assess what roots may be in the work zone and either try to work around the roots – preferred - or prune them under the guidance of the Forester.

The other trees in the vicinity of the project are all 10 feet or more from the new pipeline and should not be significantly affected. Standard tree protection practices will apply to this project.
